






3. Generally speaking, would you say things in the United States are headed in the right direction or off on the wrong track?


4. Generally speaking, would you say things in Ohio are headed in the right direction or off on the wrong track?











10. If the general election for Attorney General was held today, and you had to make a choice, who would you vote for?







This survey was conducted October 18 - 22, 2022, with 1547 likely general election voters. It has a margin of error of $\pm 2.49\%$. Known registered voters were interviewed via IVR, SMS, and online panel. This survey was weighted to a likely general election voter universe.
