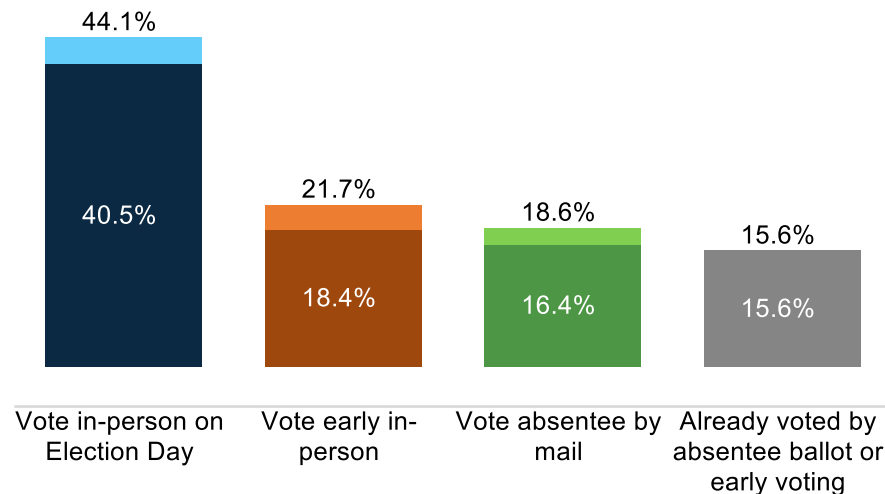

Insights & Analysis

- Voters are incredibly **pessimistic** about the **direction of the country** and its leadership.
- **Republicans retain the voter enthusiasm advantage**, with 58% of Republicans rating their interest in the election as a 10 (out of 10) compared to only 51% of Democrats (a 7-point difference). Independent “10” interest rose slightly to 45% from mid-October.
- The **generic ballot** has **now increased to R+3** – the **second-largest shift** we’ve had all year – and up from D+1 in September. Independents maintain their GOP preference at R+9. Republicans have maintained their standing with female voters, holding steady at -4.
- A **check-and-balance** Republican **on Biden** moves further ahead to an **R+7** advantage and crossing the 50% threshold.
- **Democrats** (10%) are **more likely to consider voting for a Republican** on the ballot than Republicans (9%), but that exception is reserved for state-level races like Governor and Attorney General.
- President **Biden's image has continued to worsen** (-13% net fav), and he is the most intensely unfavorable that he has been this year.
- **Inflation** remains the overwhelming top issue, **dipping slightly**; it’s still distantly followed by **abortion** and **illegal immigration**. Republicans are most concerned about inflation followed by immigration. Democrats are most concerned about inflation followed by abortion. Independents chose inflation and then are split between abortion and illegal immigration as a second issue.
- **Engagement** in this cycle because of the **Dobbs** decision **hit its plateau in September** and has not risen since. College voters have become more engaged while Independents are split.
- **Economic confidence keeps falling**, remaining low after rebounding slightly since June. Even Democrats and seniors are now split. **Personal financial outlook** has also **shifted in an even more negative trend** among these same more Democratic groups.

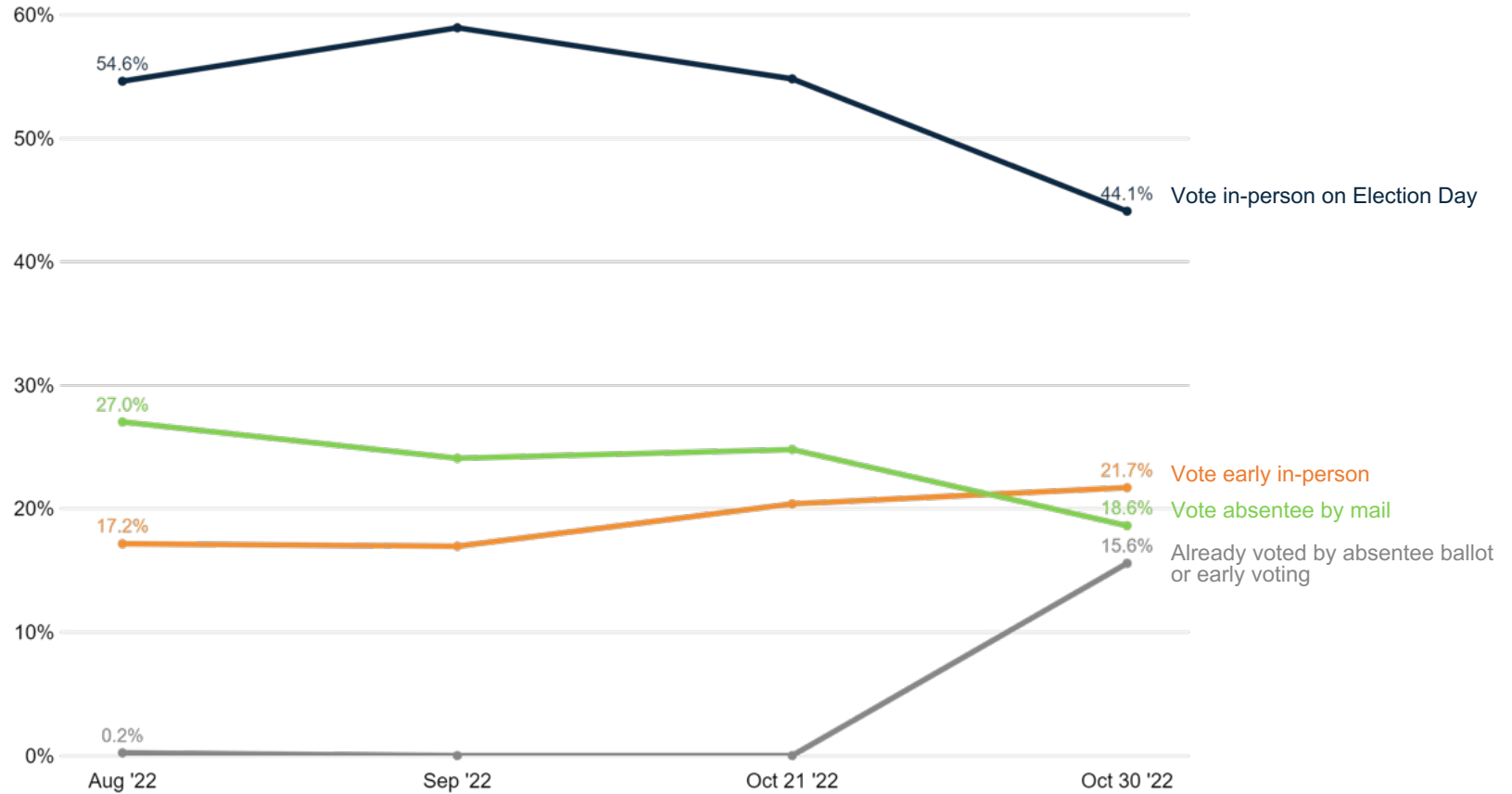
Women, older voters, and Dems are most likely to vote ABEV



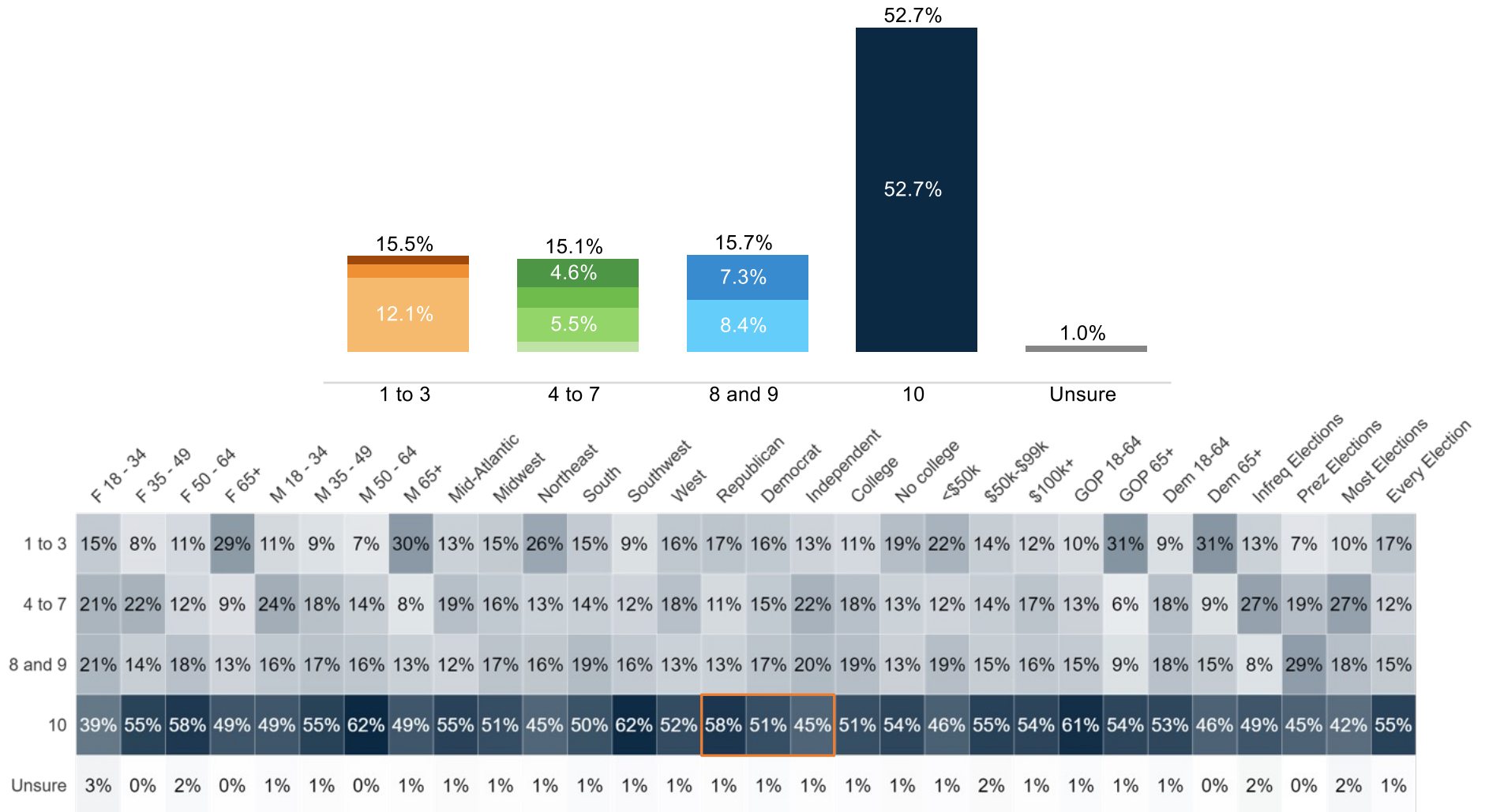

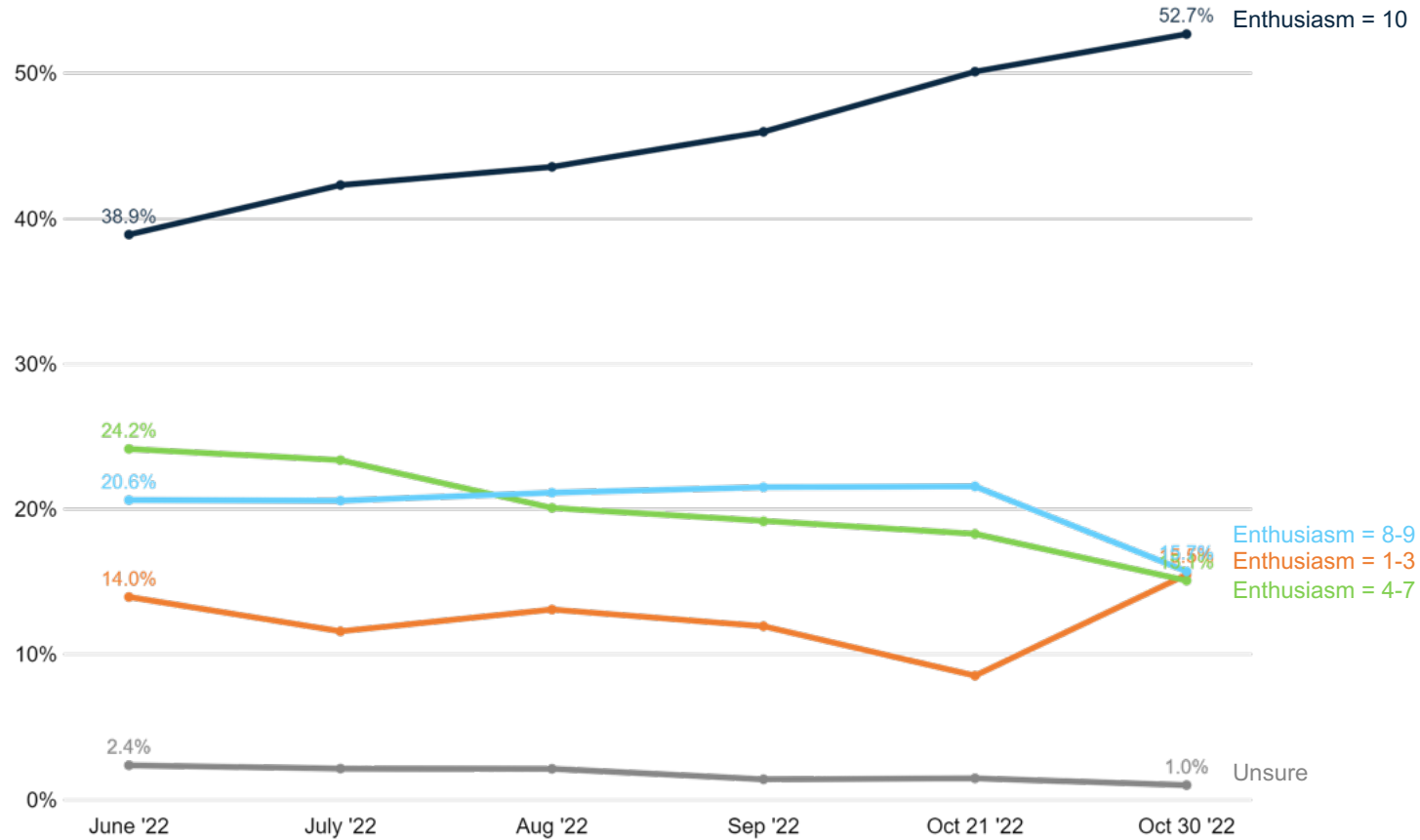


Republican interest (+7) in the election outpaces Democrats; seniors are less interested across party lines

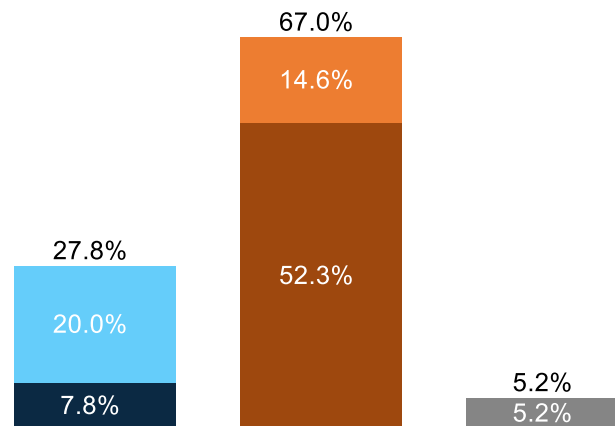


Compared to prior elections, how enthusiastic or not are you to vote this November with 10 being incredibly enthusiastic and 1 being not enthusiastic at all?

Over two-thirds of voters say country is on wrong track, including Independents; Dems under age 65 are split

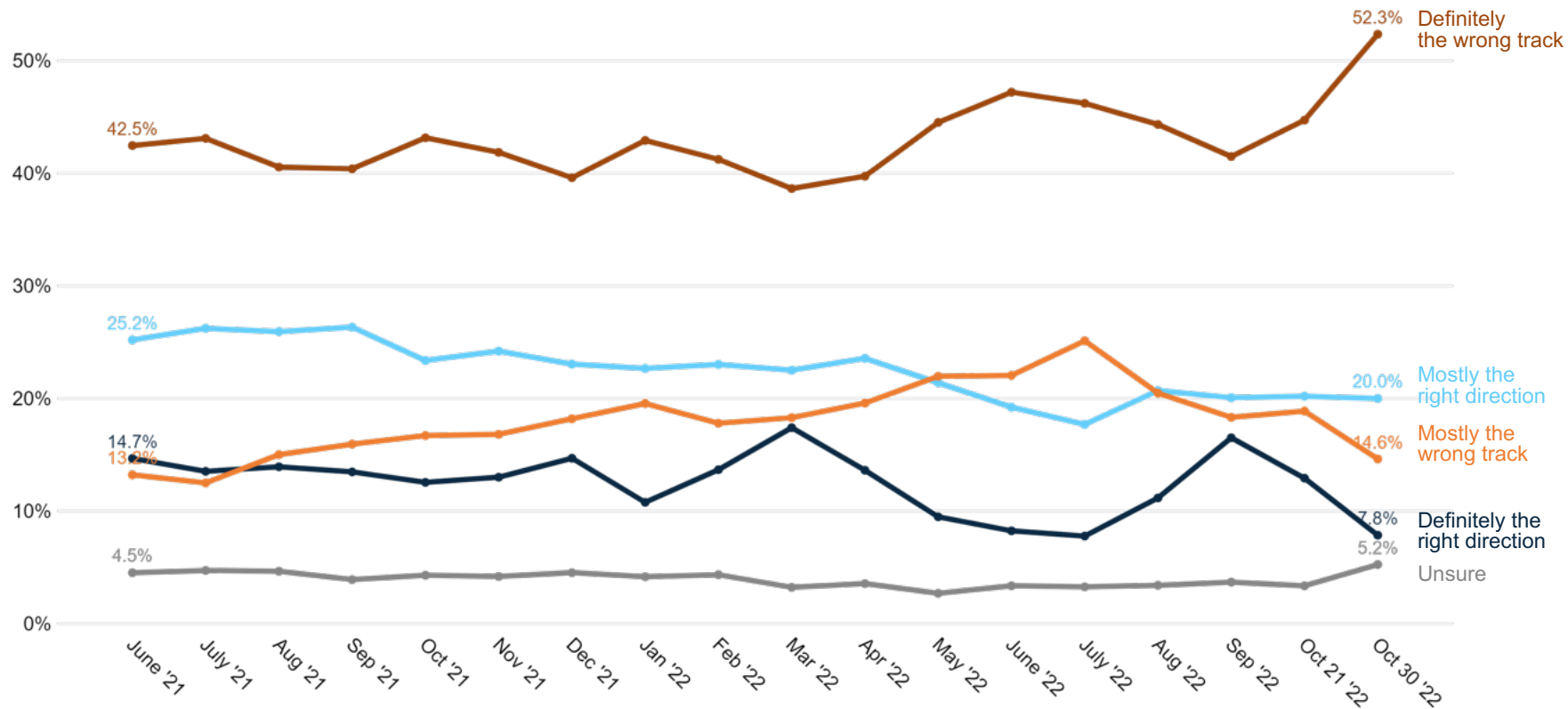

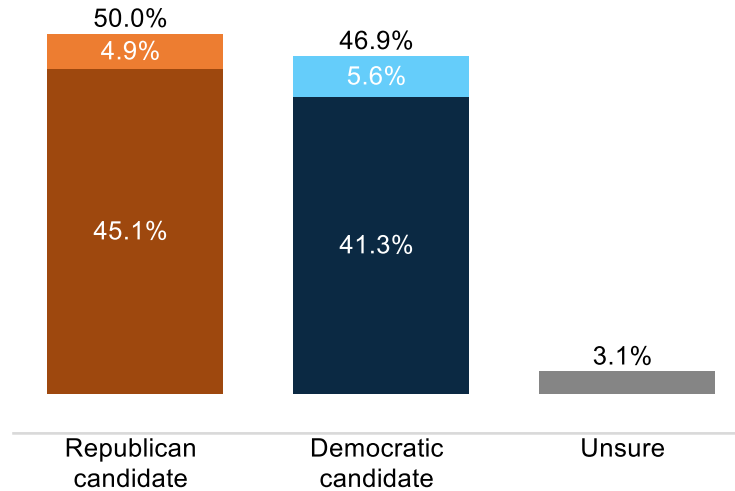

Trend: US RD/WT



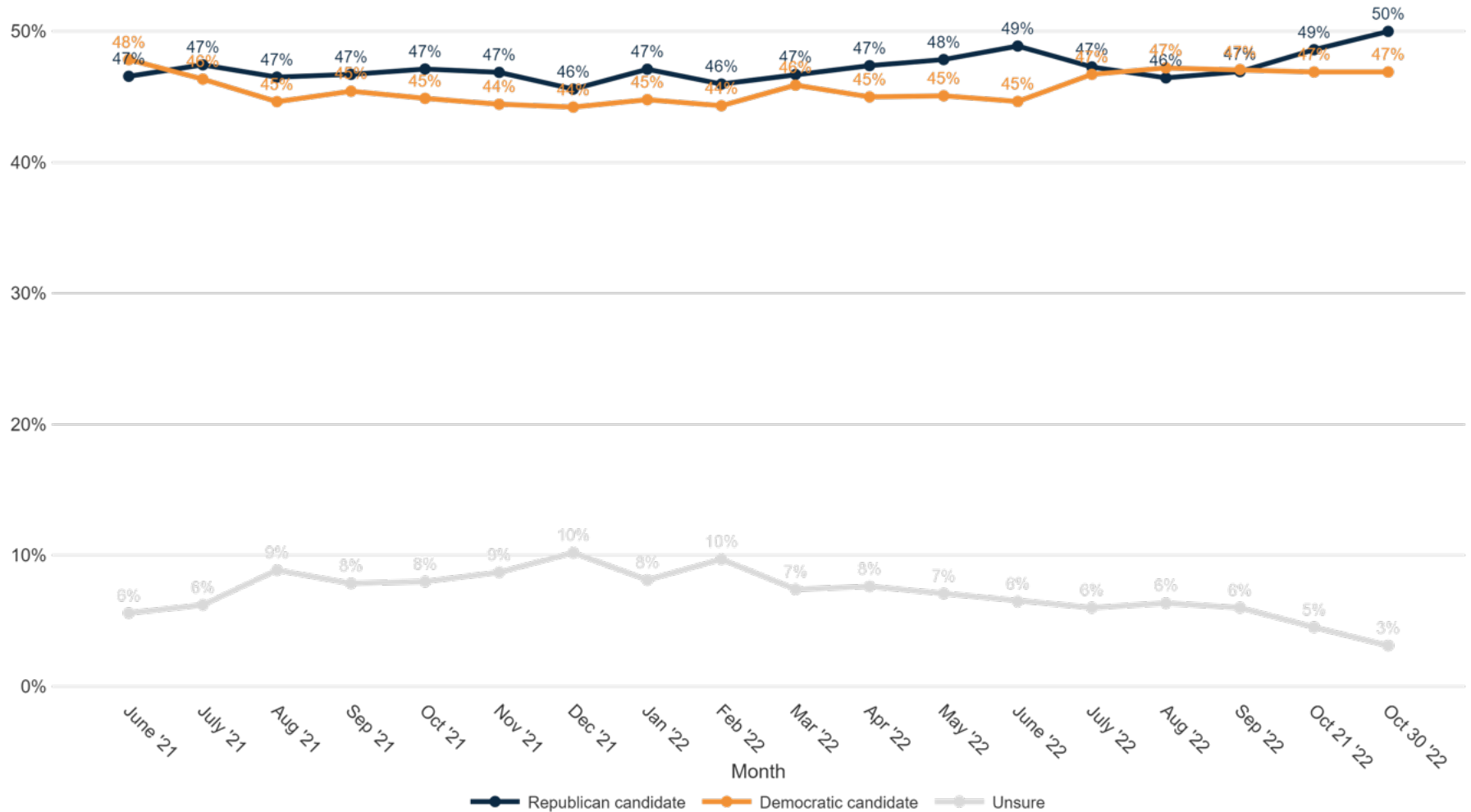

Republicans skyrocket in generic preference and achieve 50%

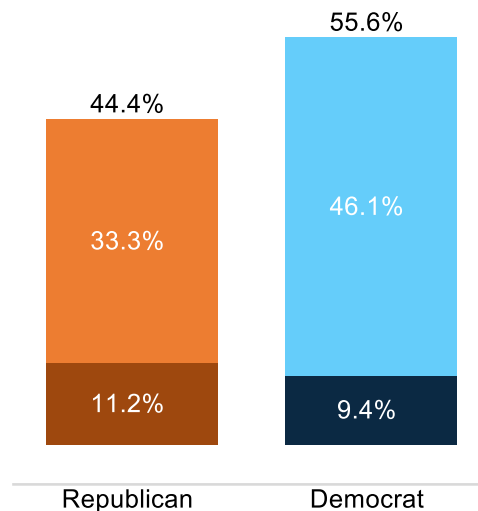

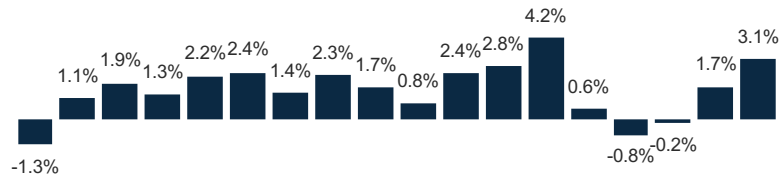

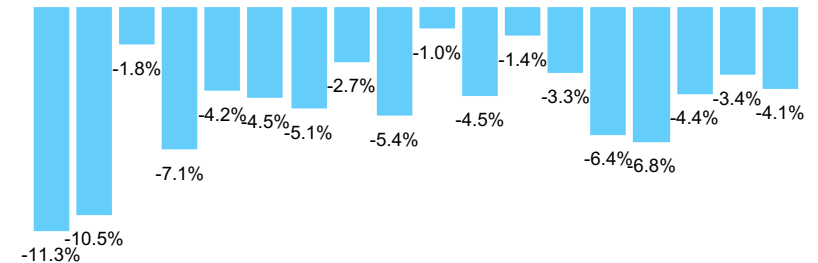
Republicans gain on generic ballot overall, and continuing to weaken Democrat's hold on female voters

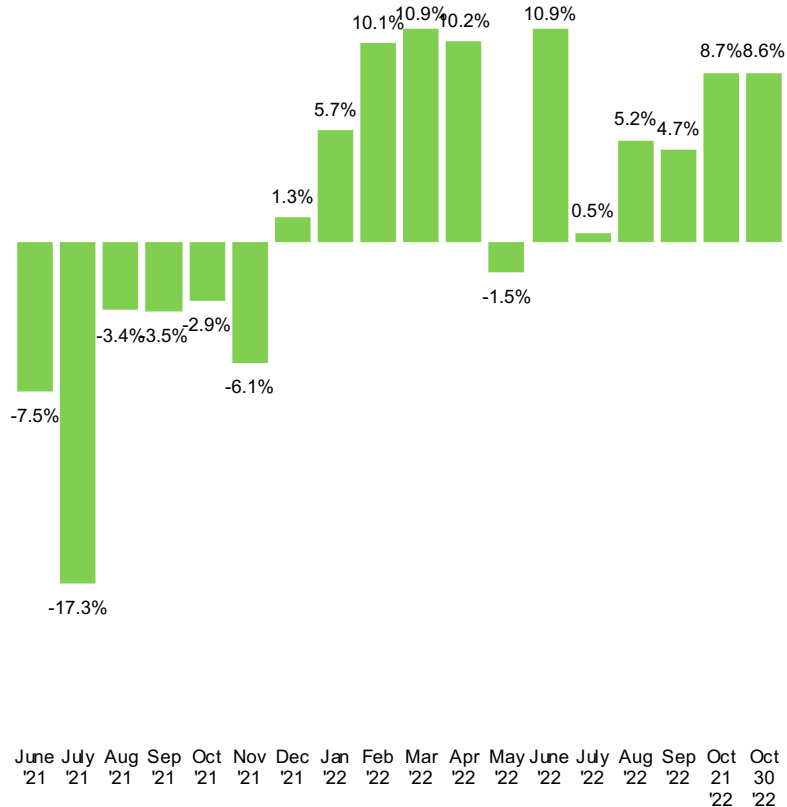

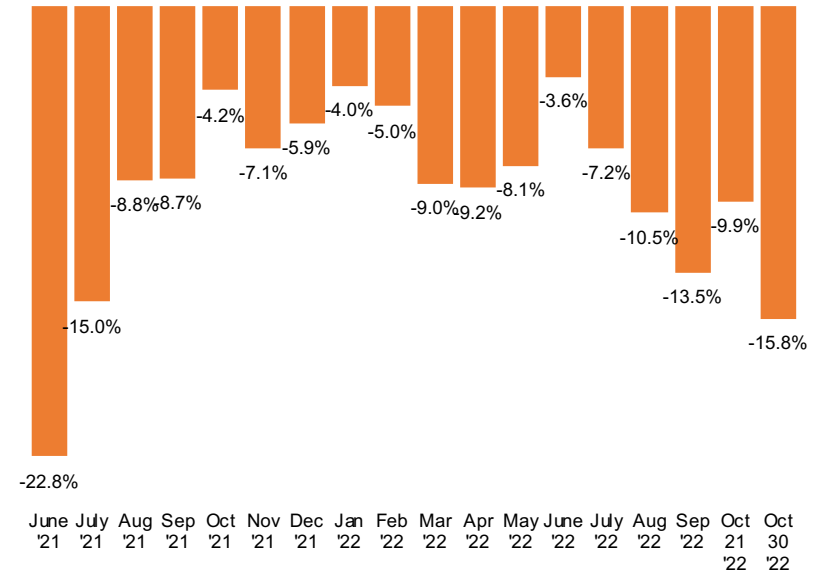

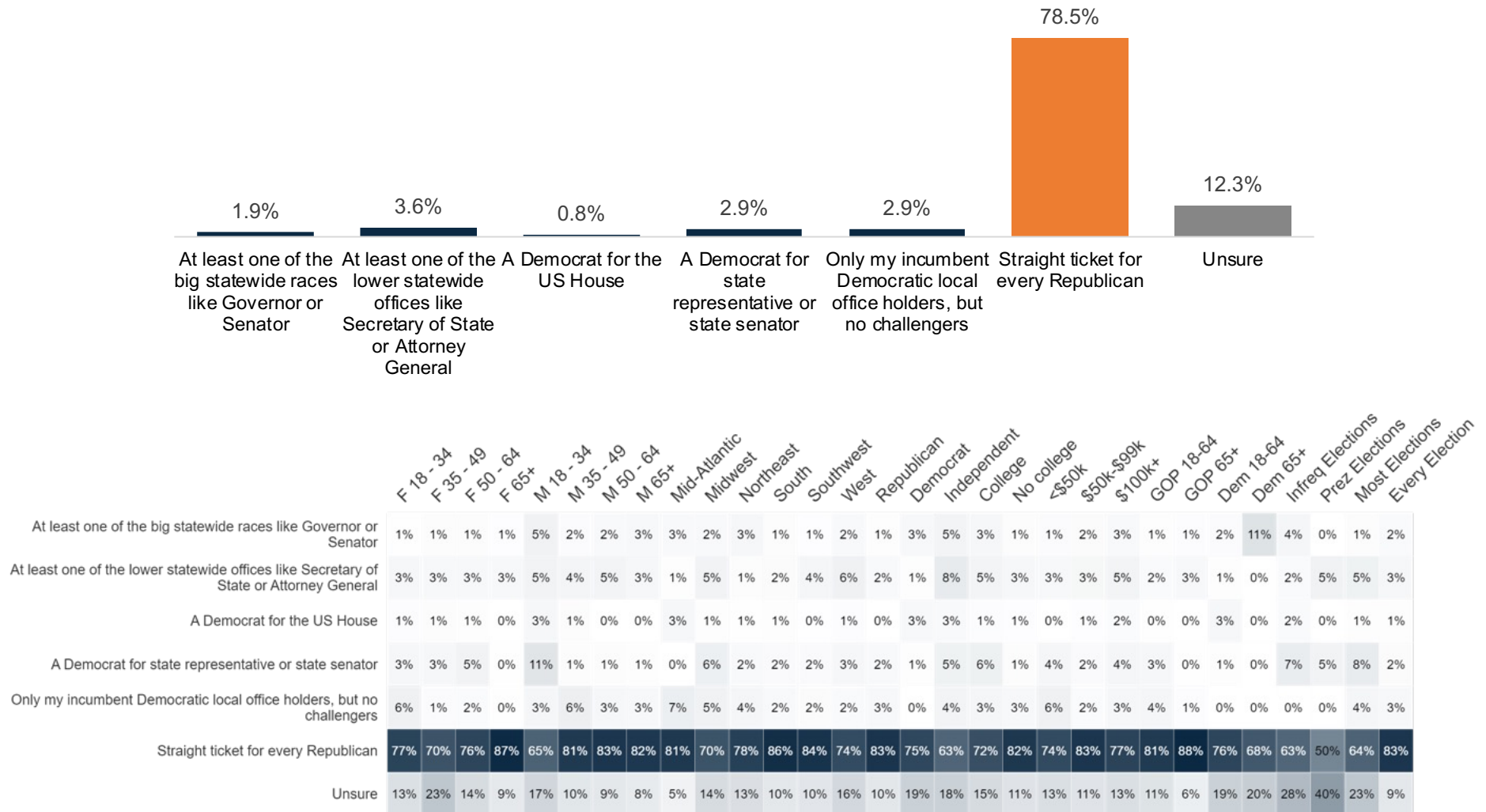
Indies (%Rep-%Dem)

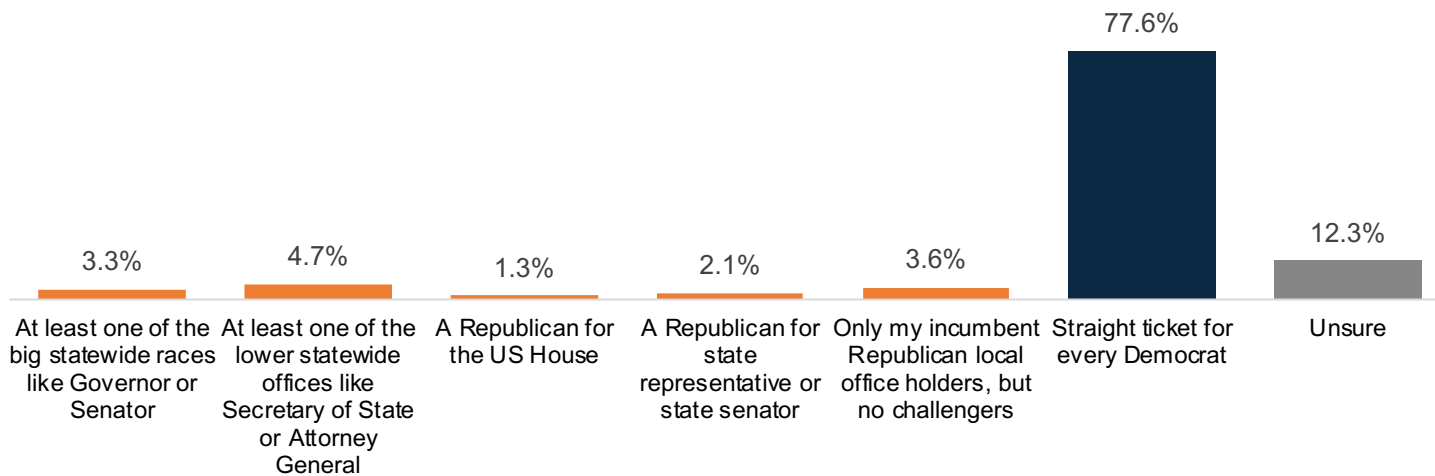


Nearly 80% of both Republicans and Democrats plan to vote for their party straight-ticket

Democrats slightly more likely to flip GOP for statewide races



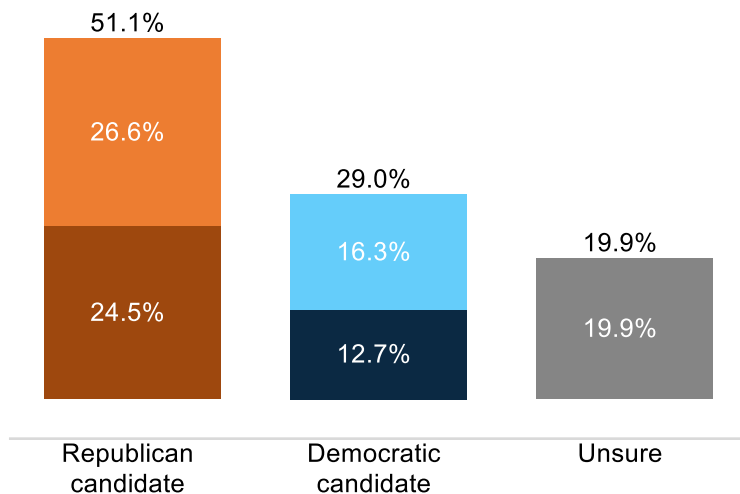

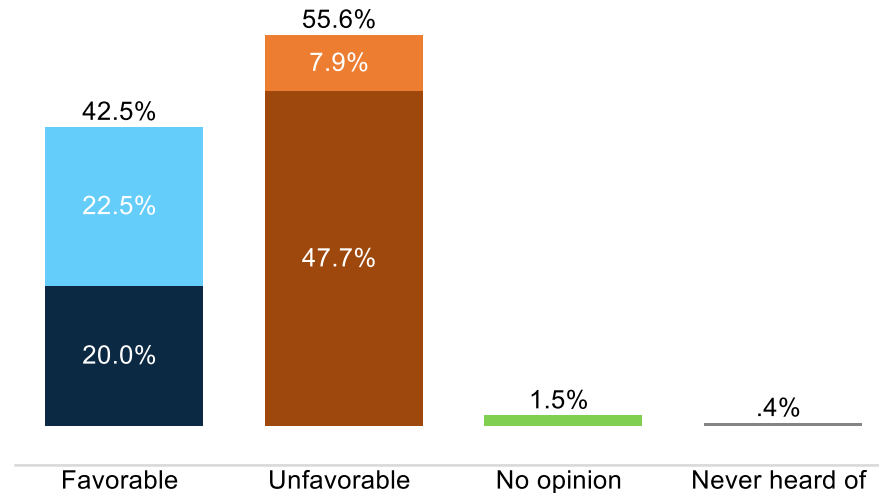
Voters believe by R+22 that their neighbors are more likely to vote Republican, a 13-point increase since early-October

How do you think your neighbors will vote in the election for U.S. Congress: for the Republican or Democratic candidate for Congress?

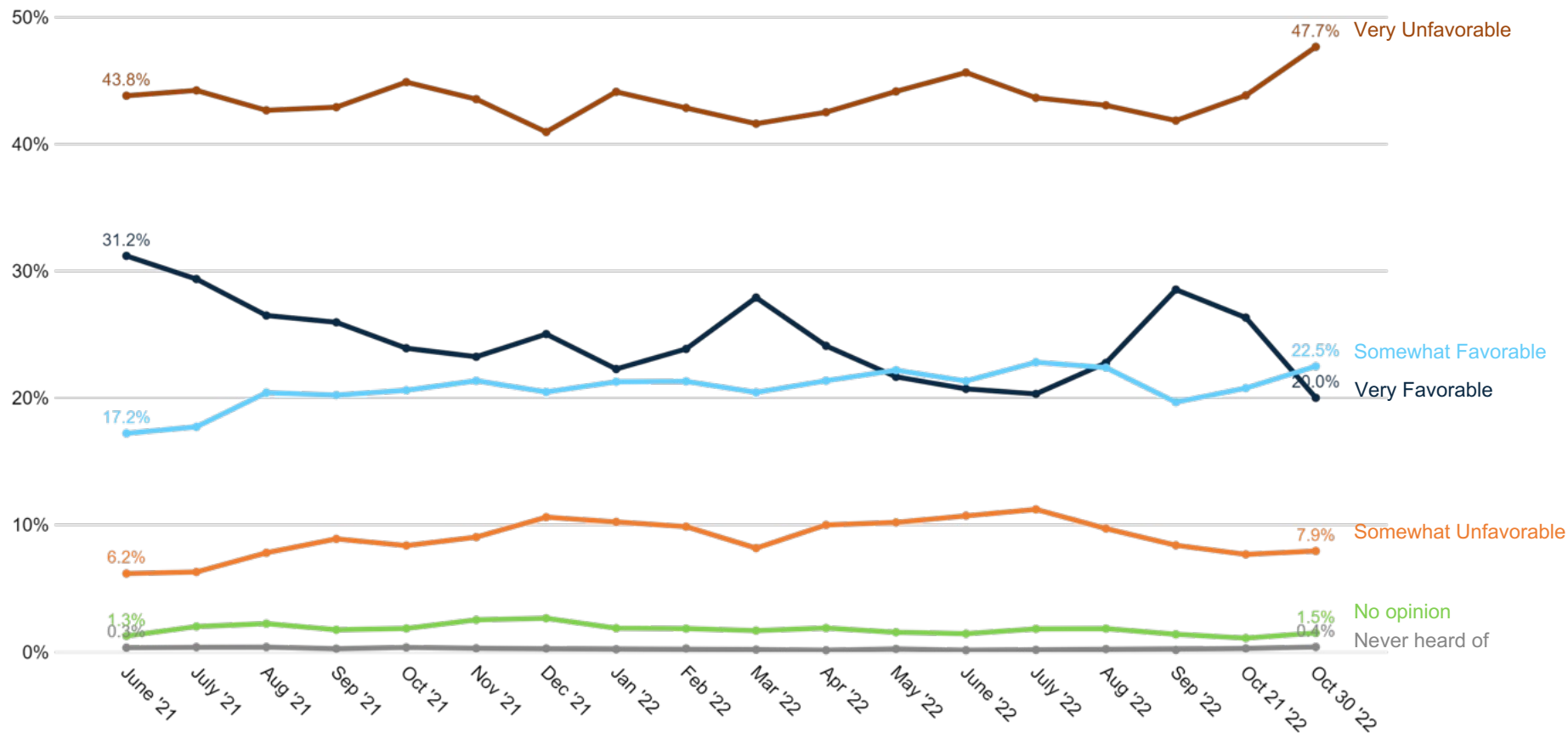

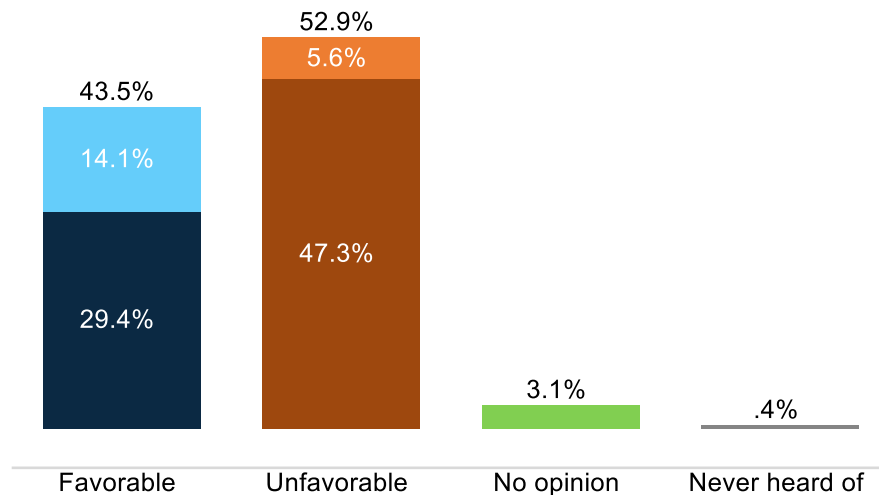

Trend: Joe Biden Image



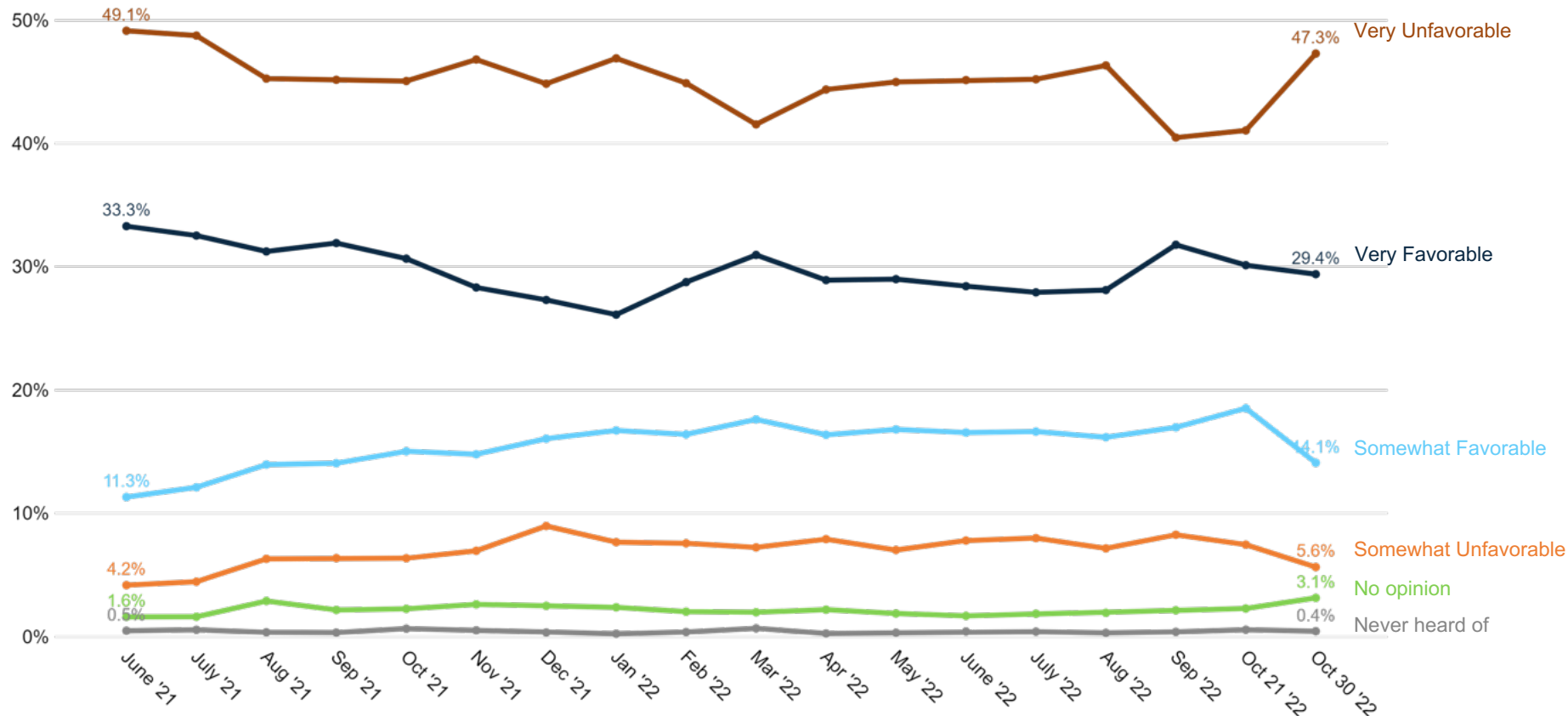
Trump's image underwater after being positive in early-October, falling with Independents and \$100k+ earners



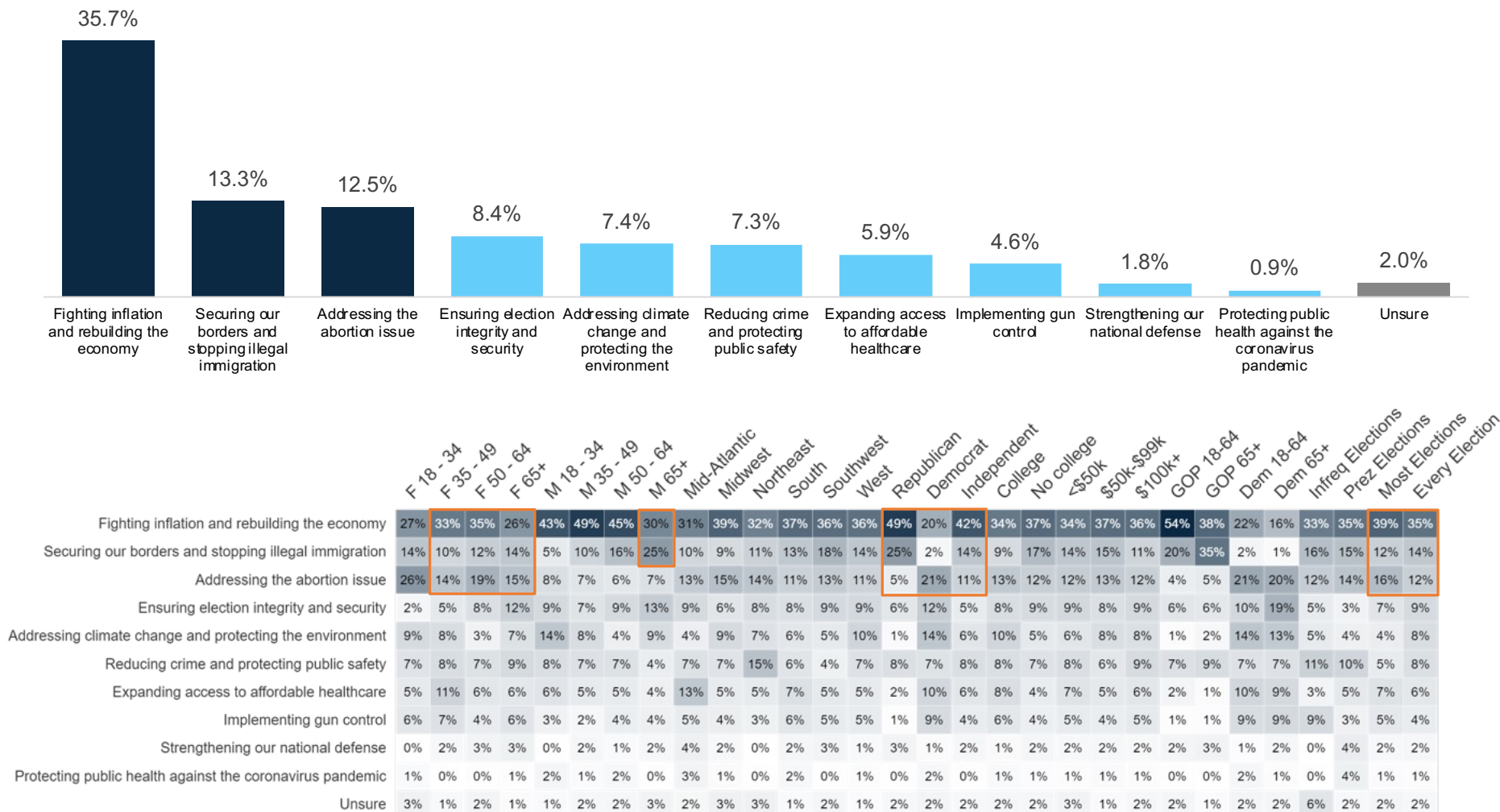

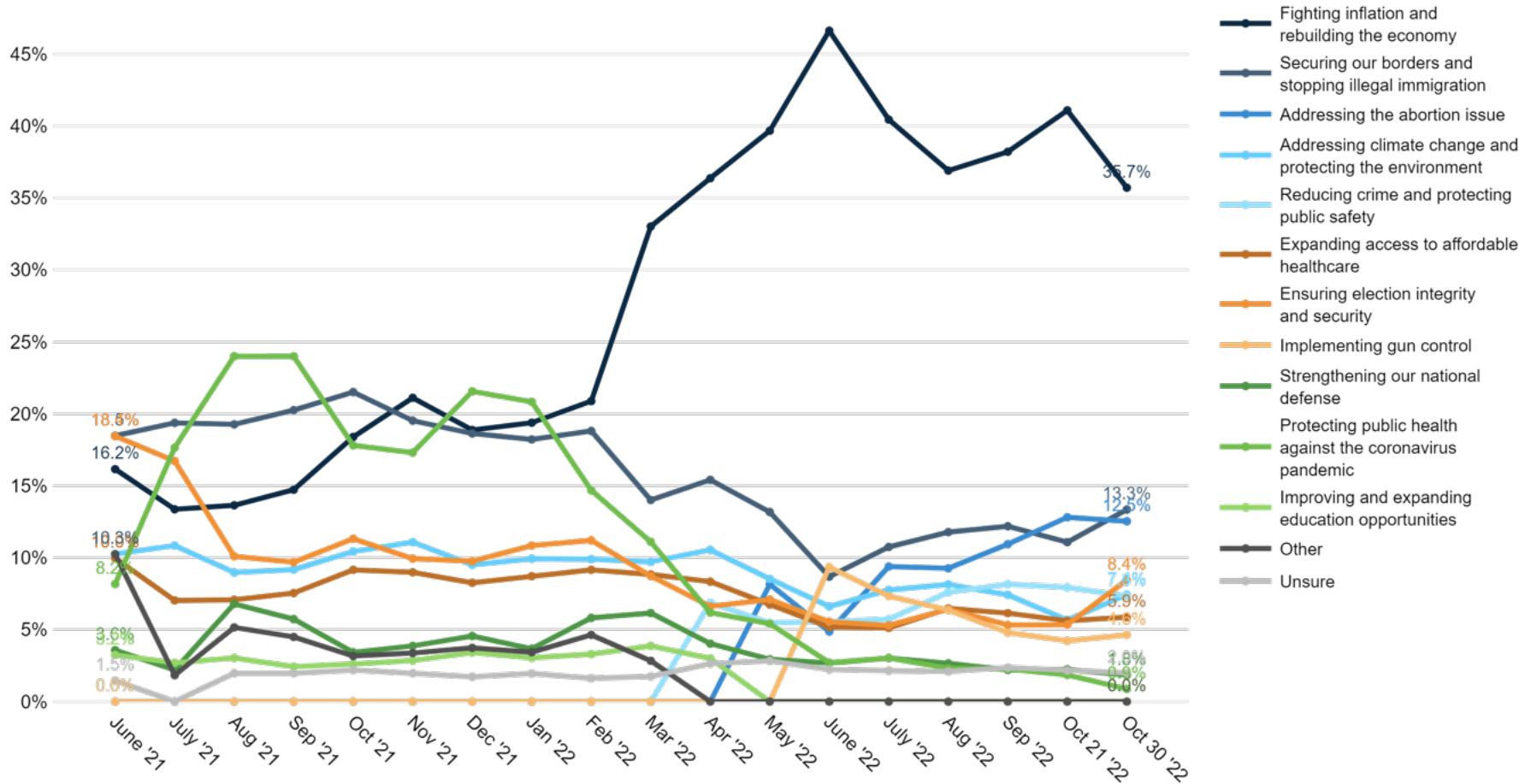

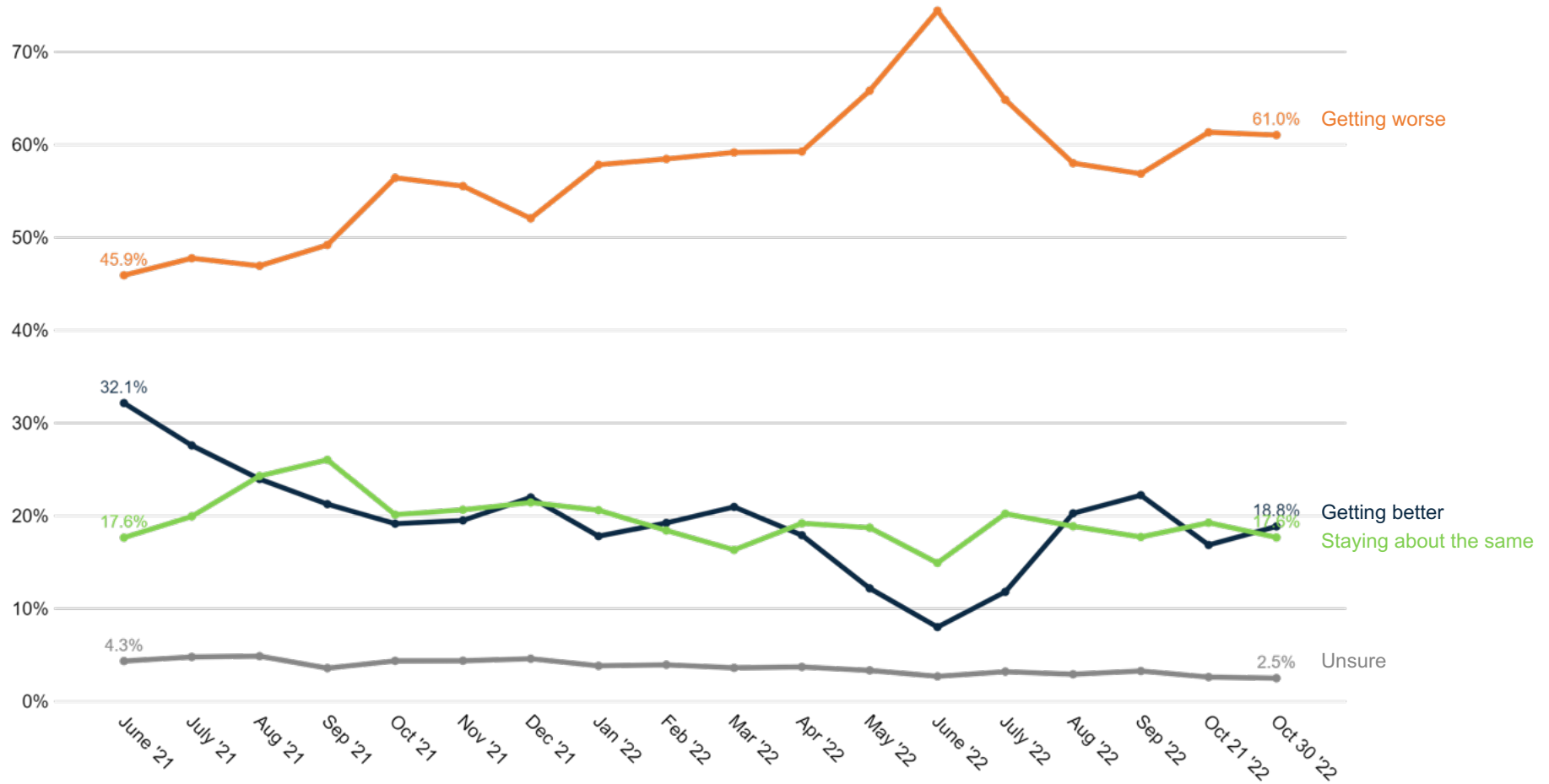


Majority of voters say economy is getting worse, especially among Independents, frequent voters, and non-college voters

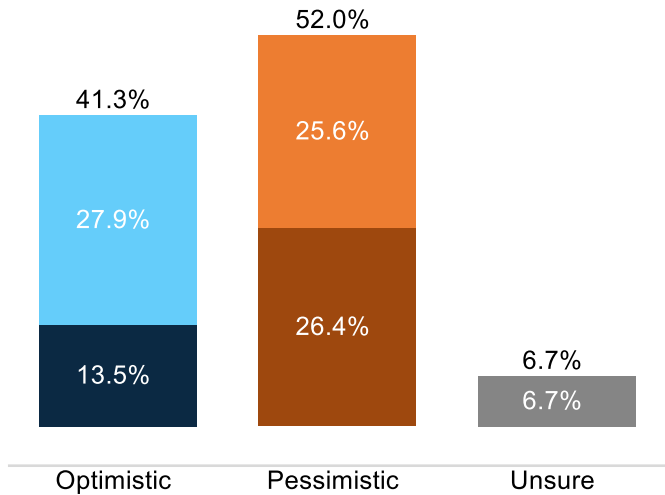


Do you believe the economy is getting better, getting worse, or staying about the same?

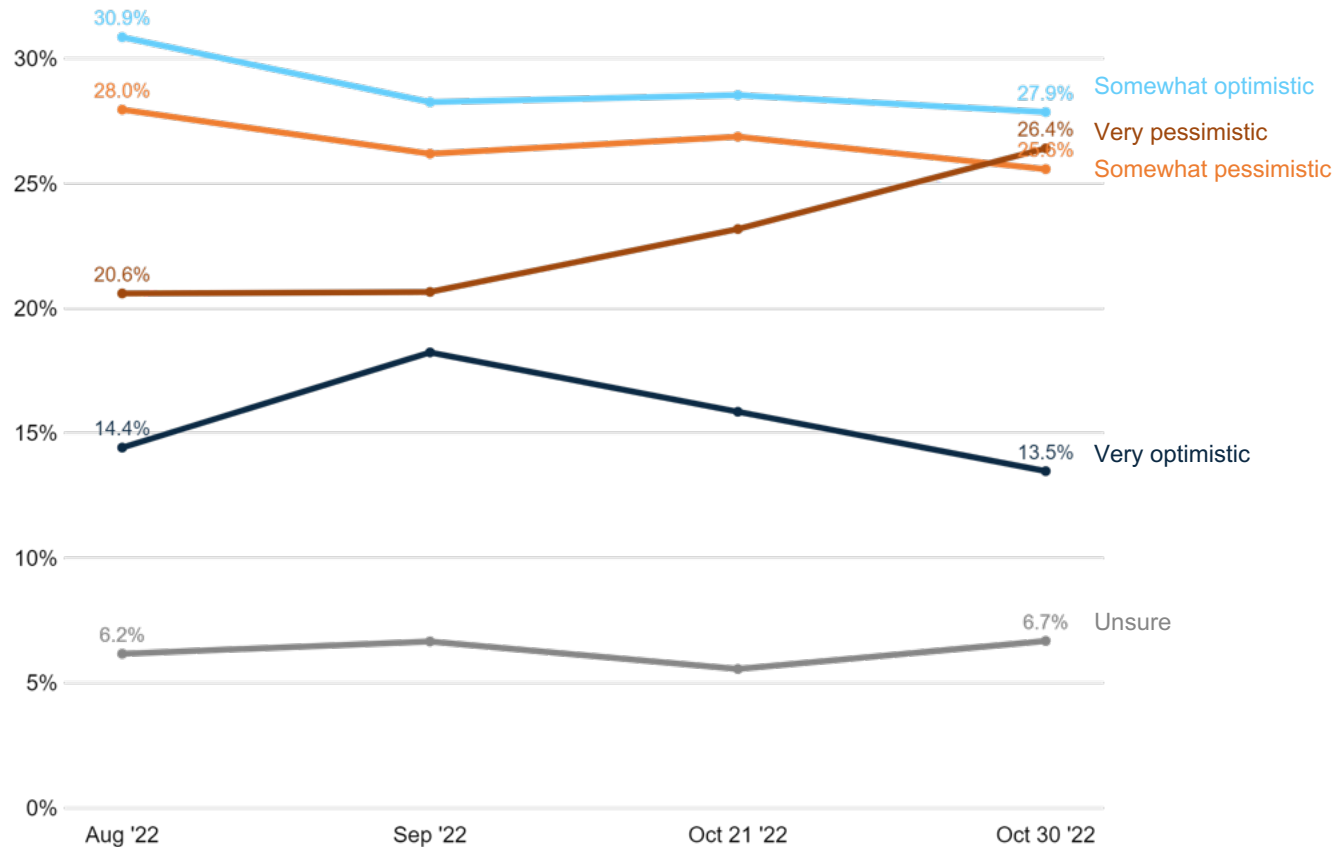

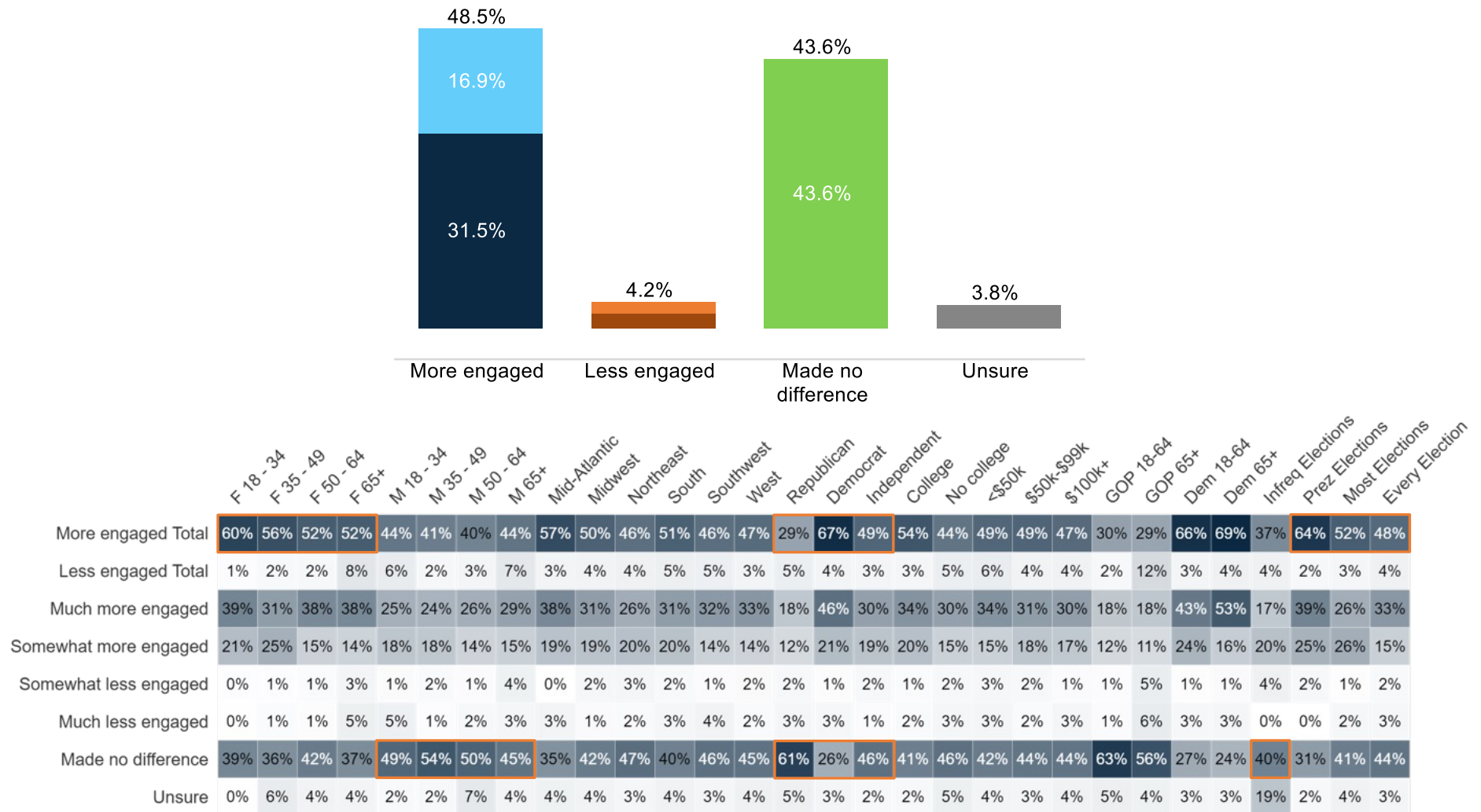

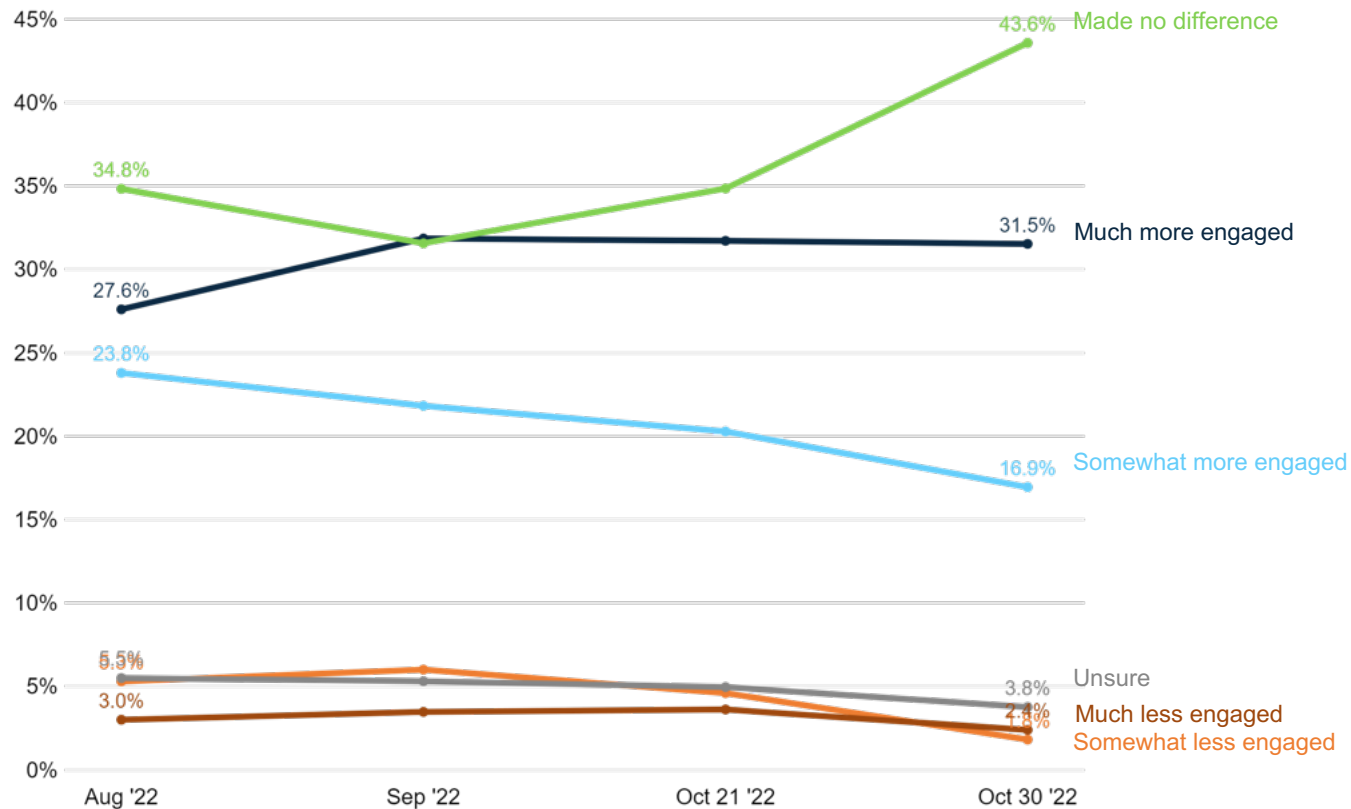
What are gas prices doing in your area, and what impact is it having on you?

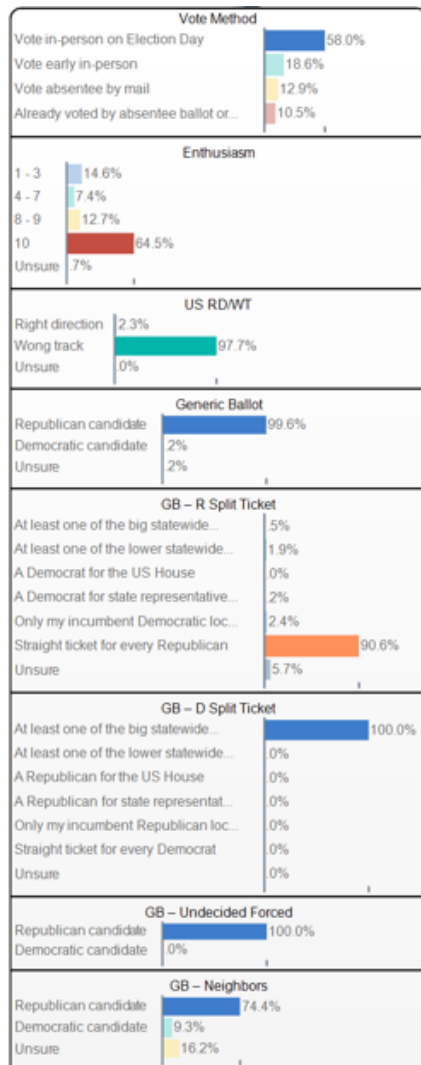
