




Survey of Likely 2024 GOP Primary Voters in the Republican Primary for President



Inflation continues to be the dominating issue for 2024 Republican primary voters

Republican primary voters remain singularly focused on inflation and the cost of living and believe that this should be the primary focus of the Republican presidential nominee in 2024. When combined with economy/jobs, **55% of Republicans are focused on pocketbook issues**. Immigration surpasses inflation with men age 70+.






TOT+ = the sum of the two most positive values

DeSantis has the strongest "very favorable" rating and is the only potential candidate who saw an increase in net favorability


Former President Donald **Trump** and Florida Governor Ron **DeSantis** share the highest favorable among Republican primary voters. Pence and Cruz are close behind in image. **Former Trump Officials** Haley and Pompeo as well as Texas Governor Greg Abbott round out the next most favorable group. Chris **Christie** is the only Republican politician with a **negative image** among the voter base (38% unfavorable).





President Trump continues to lead the field, but he saw a 5% drop in support since October and DeSantis is now with 5 points

Following the midterms, the hypothetical 2024 presidential primary **race draws closer** between former President Donald Trump and Governor DeSantis. Trump leads with younger voters while DeSantis holds older voters, and middle-aged voters are split. **Trump** leads DeSantis with **moderate voters**.



If President Trump decides not to run, DeSantis has increased his lead over all other potential candidates by 6 points

Without the former President in the race, DeSantis runs away from the field, and Mike Pence doubles his share. Senator Ted **Cruz** and Ambassador **Haley** each garner 5%.

The older someone is or the more educated they are, the more likely they are to be conservative.




