Insights & Analysis

- 60% of voters say the U.S. is **on the wrong track**. Perceptions of **Joe Biden** (-5 net favorable) remain very low with nearly 40% of voters holding a very unfavorable opinion.
- The **generic ballot is tied at 45%**, with Republicans dropping -1% since June. Republicans lost ground with Independents but mostly made up for it with non-college voters.
 - Independents are slightly more likely to view Republicans as more extreme than Democrats. **Only 7% of voters say neither party is extreme.**
- Voters' **top priority** remains definitively **inflation and the economy** (36%). Republicans also prioritize illegal immigration while Democrats are more focused on gun control and climate change. Just 8% of voters prioritize public safety. **84% of voters feel safe in their communities.**
- **Donald Trump** (-6 net fav) is slightly unfavorable and **Tucker Carlson** (+2 net fav) is only -10 net fav with Independents and favorable with 1-in-5 Democrats.
 - Among GOP primary voters, **24% will only vote for Trump** while 38% will consider Trump and other candidates. **29% will vote for anyone except Trump.**
- **Trump pulls further ahead in the GOP primary to 53%**, followed by **Vivek Ramaswamy** at 11%, who overtakes Ron DeSantis at 10%. DeSantis has plummeted from having 29% of the vote in March.
- **Joe Biden leads the presidential ballot by 3 points** (46% Biden / 43% Trump / 10% undecided) with Trump falling behind compared to last month's poll. Against a generic non-Trump GOP nominee, **Biden leads by 2-points** (42% / 40%) with more voters undecided (17%).

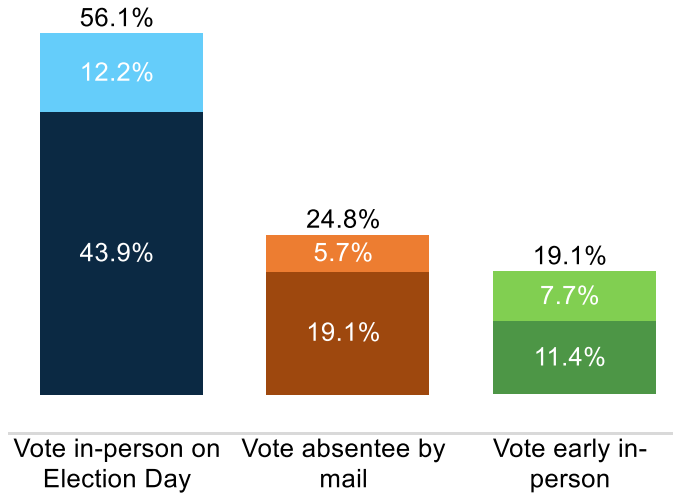
Insights & Analysis – Cont.

- **50% of voters support an impeachment probe into President Biden’s alleged illegal influence peddling**, including over a quarter of Democrats and just under half of Independents. Over a third of voters *strongly* support the probe.
- On the **cocaine White House scandal**, 31% of voters believe the Secret Service covered up the culprit and another 25% say they should’ve tried harder to apprehend a suspect. 27% say the investigation, which turned up no suspects, was unbiased and legitimate.
- **56% of voters support a federal limit of 15 weeks for abortions** (23% oppose; 21% unsure), including a plurality of Democrats.
- 71% of voters support the **Buck Stops Here Act** (10% oppose) with wide support across demographic groups.
- 56% of voters support **the policy requiring asylum-seekers to first apply to a country other than the U.S.** (25% oppose), including a plurality of Democrats and a majority of Independents.
- 55% of voters support the **Hollywood Strikes** of writers and actors (25% oppose). Rural voters and Republicans are the least likely to support the strike.
- The **celebrity frontrunner for public office** is Dwayne “The Rock” Johnson (16%) followed closely by Oprah Winfrey (15%). Joe Rogan leads the back bench at 8%.
- 49% of voters say the federal government is being **dishonest** (24% very dishonest) about what it knows **regarding UFOs and other unexplained phenomena**.

Insights & Analysis – Cont.

- **81% of voters say they don't pay attention to political advertisements.** TV is the most relevant advertisement medium (8% pay attention).
- **On what must be communicated to earn a vote**, voters are looking for **honesty/integrity** (26%) ahead of **ideas/vision/platform** (9%). Just 5% are focused on partisanship.
- Voters are most likely to turn to Google/web search (54%) or a TV interview (51%) when **seeking information on political candidates**. 34% turn to social media as well and 31% to the candidate's website. Nearly a quarter of voters **will ask a family member's opinion**.
- The **primary emotions looking ahead to the 2024 election** are anticipation (32%) and fear (23%), followed by disgust (13%). Partisans tend to be more fearful while Independents register higher feelings of disgust. **Women are much more fearful about the 2024 election than men.**
- **Segmentation Analysis** identified four groups via machine learning: **GOP Base** (36%), **Democrat Base** (32%), **Independent/Moderates** (16%), and **Young Democrats** (17%).
 - The *Independent/Moderates* segment leans Republican on the generic ballot, is pessimistic about the direction of the country, and is deeply unfavorable of Biden (slightly less so of Trump). This segment skews female, tends to be under 55, and lives mostly in the suburbs. The majority are non-college educated earning <\$50k.

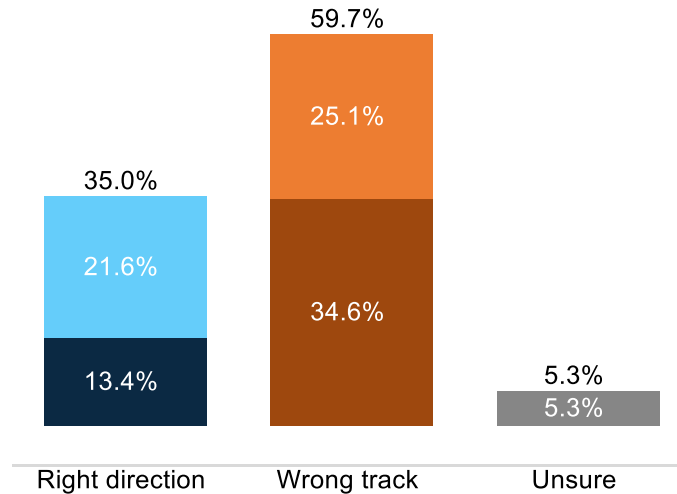

How do you plan to vote in the 2024 general election for President, Congress, and state offices?

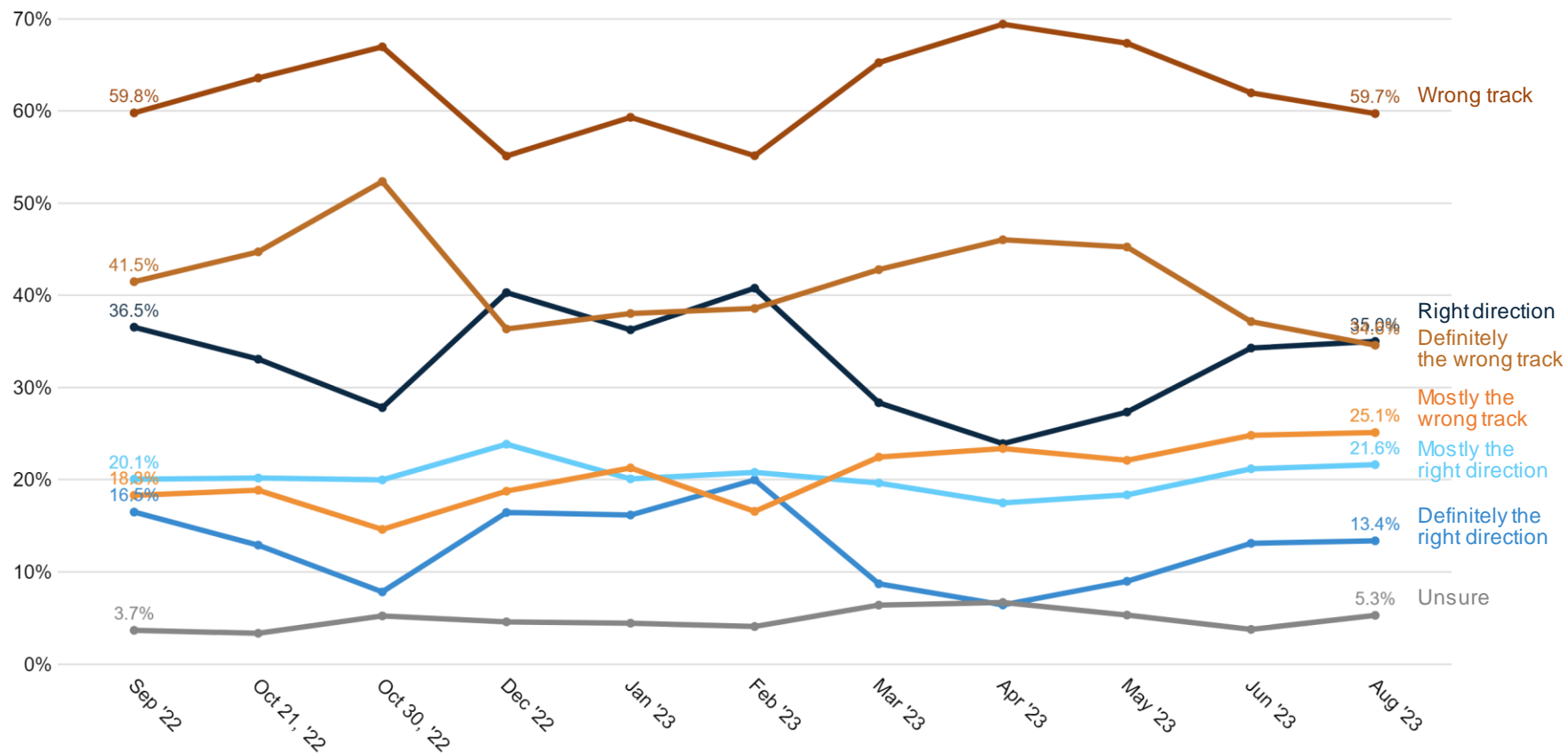

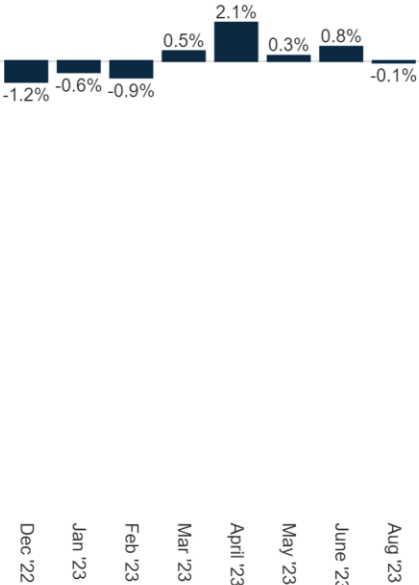

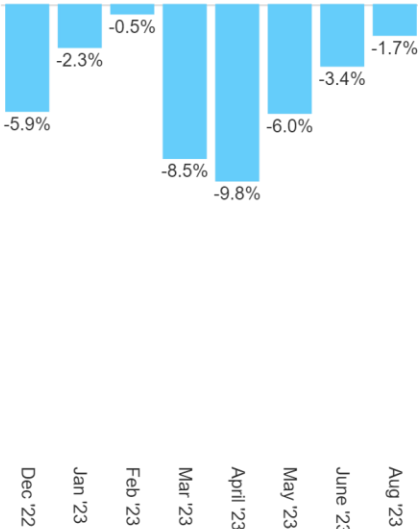
If the 2024 general election was held today, and you had to make a choice, would you vote for the Republican or Democratic candidate for Congress?

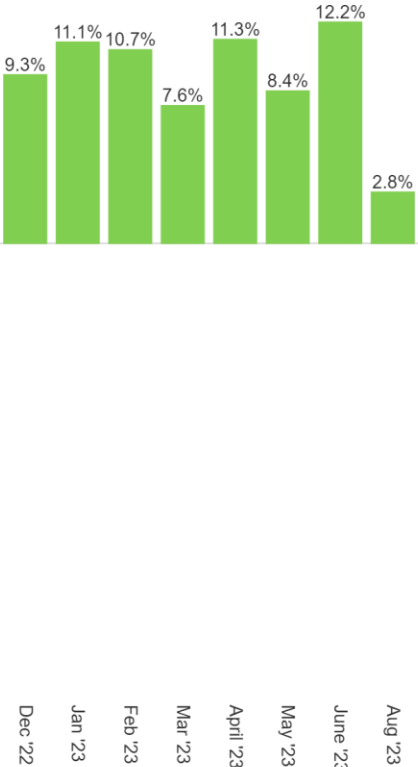

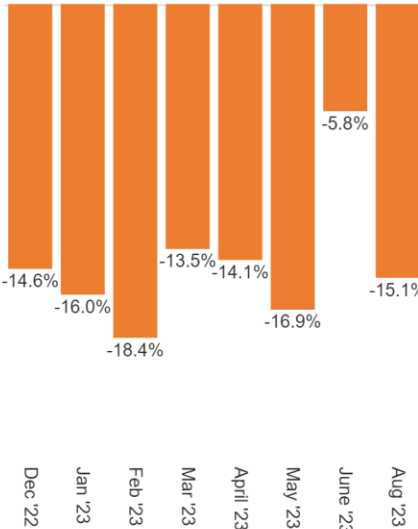
Females (%Rep-%Dem)

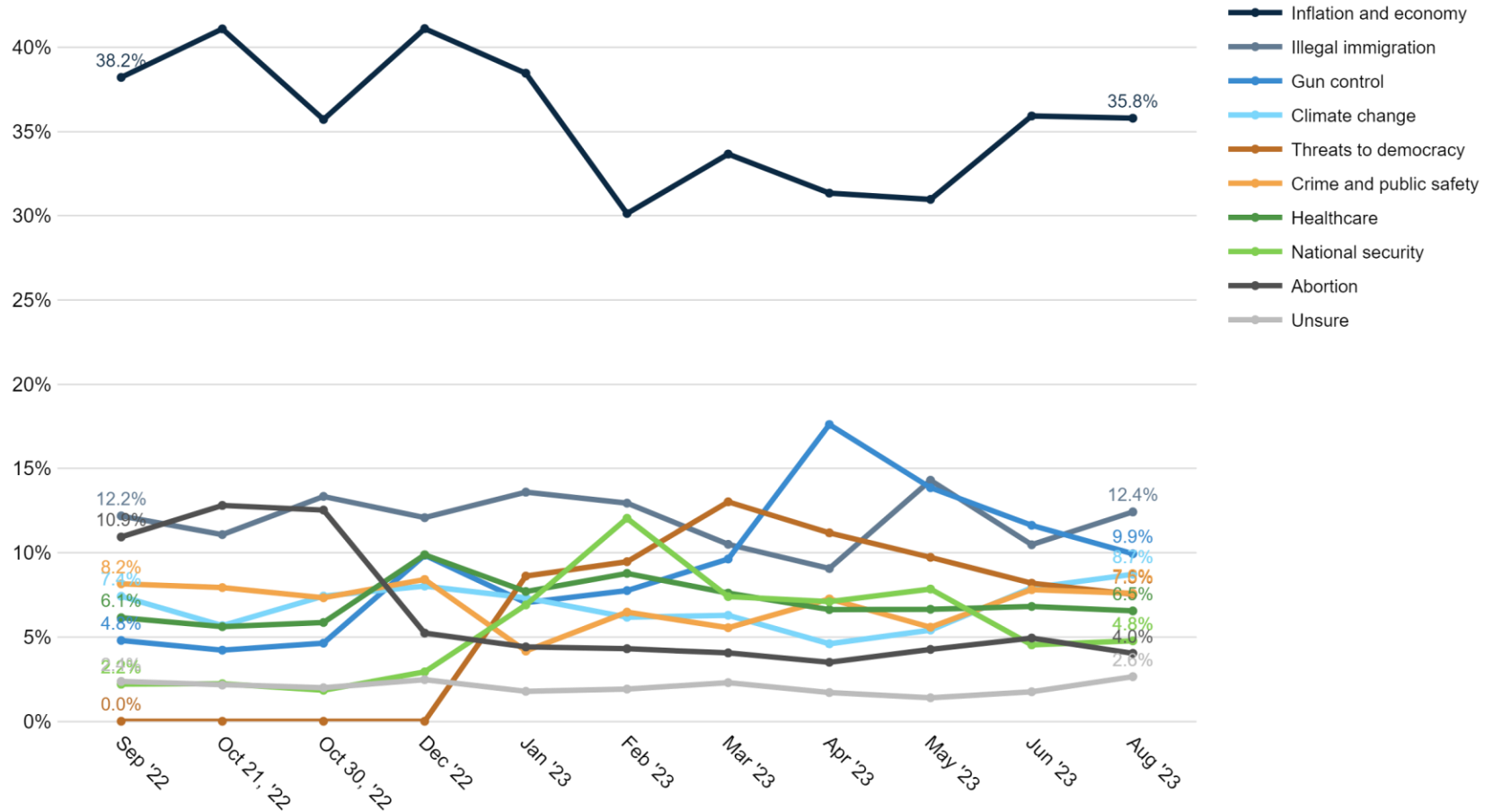

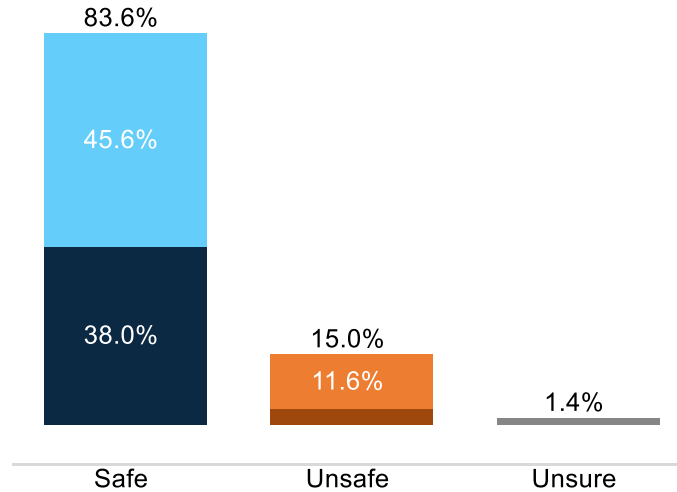

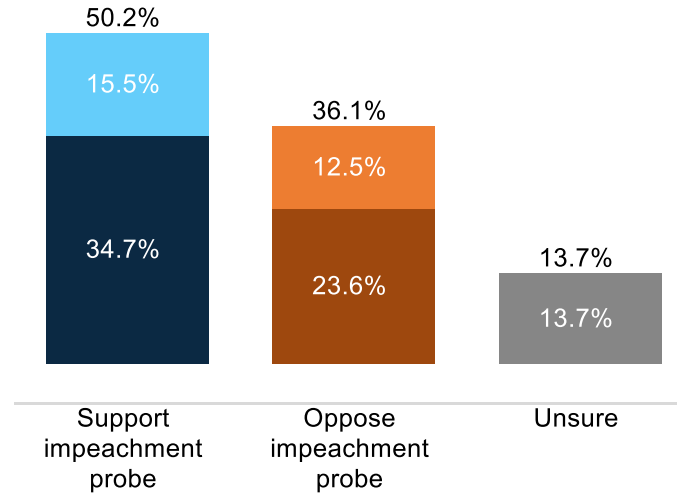

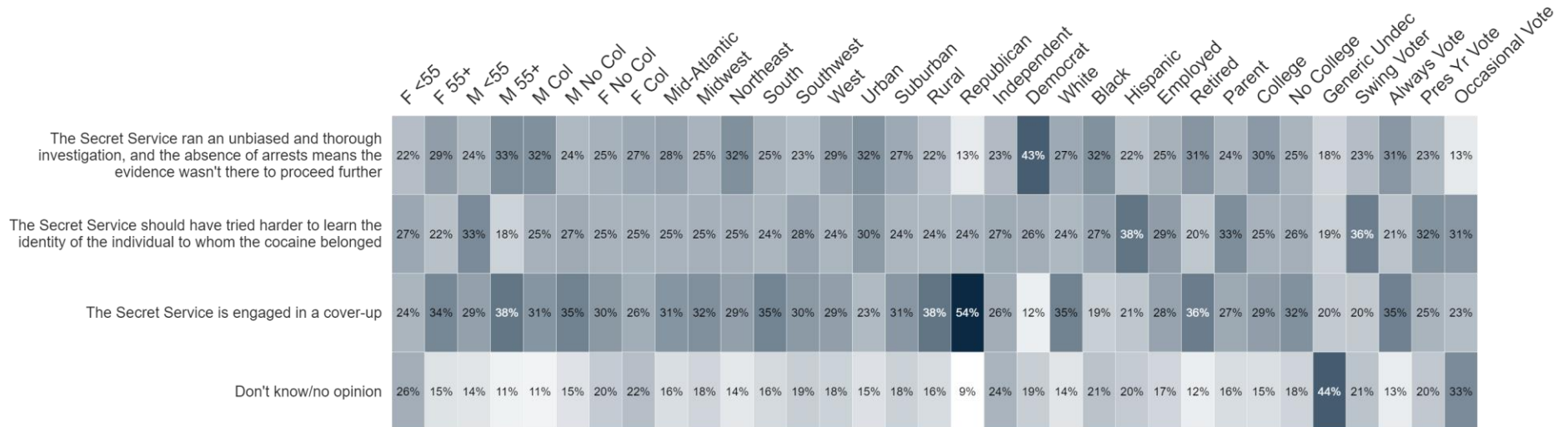

Trend: 15-Week Abortion Ban



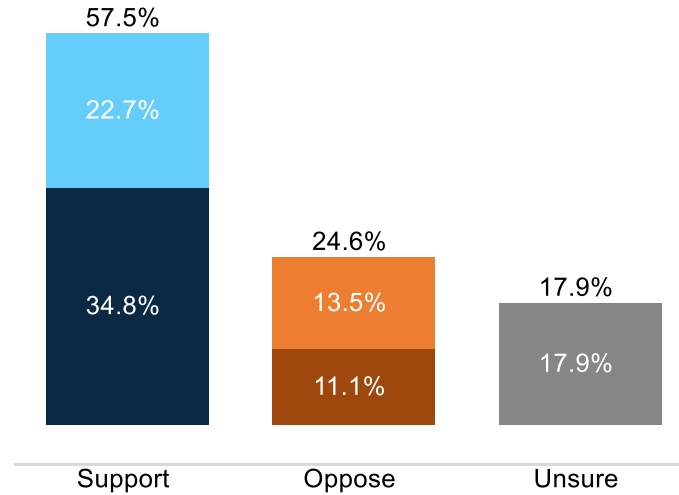
