

# Survey of Likely 2026 General Election Voters National

May 6 – 8, 2025 | n=1500 | ±2.51%

- Despite 92% <u>negative press coverage</u> of the Trump Administration's first 100 days, the Democrats' toxic brand is thus far preventing them from capitalizing. Voters' views of Republicans in Congress (48 fav - 49 unfav; -1 net fav) continues to outpace Democrats in Washington (44 fav / 53 unfav; -9 net fav).
  - Supporting the GOP's sustained advantage on image is the fact that voters trust Republicans more than Democrats to handle multiple key issues, including:
  - Economy and jobs: R+2 (47 − 45)
  - Cost of living: R+2 (46 44)
  - Illegal immigration and border security: R+25 (56 31)
  - Crime and public safety: R+13 (51 − 38)
  - Cutting wasteful government spending: R+18 (51 33)
  - Foreign affairs: R+2 (46 44)
- The battle for control of Congress is now tied at 47% on the generic congressional ballot.
   This is the GOP's best showing since February. For comparison's sake, the Democrats held a +6 generic ballot advantage in the RealClearPolitics polling average on this date during Trump's first term (May 2017).
  - Since the April National Voter Trend Survey (NVT), Republicans have increased ballot share by 8% with married women, and there was a net 10% swing towards the GOP with union members. Hispanics swung net 4% towards the GOP on the generic ballot.
- **Trump's image** (47 fav 51 unfav) has ticked up a few points to his best showing since February. Trump's improved standing is being driven by **married women**, who now have a net favorable opinion of him for the first time in his second term.



- Union households now view Trump more favorably than non-union homes, underscoring the political realignment of Trump's GOP as the party of the working class.
- Trump's popularity with black men continues and has reached a new high of 45%.
- Voter optimism on the direction of the country (45% right direction) has risen to the highest level since the beginning of the Cygnal NVT Survey.
- Last summer (July), 71% said the country was on the wrong track and only 24% felt the U.S. was headed in the right direction. May's numbers are a remarkable net 40% swing upward in optimism since last summer.
- Fresh off her "Fighting Oligarchy" tour, New York Congresswoman Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez (AOC) stands at 39 fav 40 unfav. Partisan attitudes on AOC emerge with 65% of GOP voters viewing her unfavorably and 64% of Democrats viewing the hard-left politician favorably.
- Meanwhile, her fellow New Yorker, Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer is viewed far less favorably and is more emblematic of the Democratic Party's struggles nationally. Near half (49%) of voters' view Schumer unfavorably, compared to just 33% who have a favorable view of him.
  - Swing voters on the generic congressional ballot are even more sour on Schumer (27% favorable). While Schumer's not quite yet the lightning rod Nancy Pelosi provided Republicans with for years, his negative standing with the public may still get him some free earned media in GOP ads leading up to the 2026 midterm elections.
  - As she considers a Democratic primary challenge to Schumer next year, AOC is more popular than Schumer with every major demographic group tested and is viewed much more net favorably than Schumer with Democrats and liberals.



- One silver lining for Democrats (though a cloudy one) might be that voters, just narrowly, see Barack Obama—not Schumer—as the current leader of the Democratic Party. That someone more than eight years removed from the White House is still viewed as the leader of the Democratic Party is representative of the current predicament of the Democrats as a leaderless party without direction.
  - **Schumer** doesn't come in that far behind at 10%, followed by former Vice-President and 2024 nominee **Kamala Harris** at just 7%.
  - Perhaps giving hope to the idea of Harrs running in 2028, Democrat voters still see her as the party's leader.
  - More voters view far-left figures like AOC (6%) and Bernie Sanders (5%) as the Democratic Party's leader than the Democrat who still occupied the White House just four months ago, Joe Biden (3%).
- As he prepares for his planned public step back from leading the Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE), Elon Musk's image has seen a slight improvement since March (44 fav 52 unfav). In a good sign for Republicans concerned by Democrat plans to make Musk a centerpiece of the midterms, Musk's image has improved most with Independents and swing voters who will be key to which party holds the House majority after next November's elections.
- DOGE saw its favorables **tick up a point** to 44% favorable with those viewing it unfavorably holding steady at 48%. That Musk's image continues to run below the department he's run is likely due to the **personal nature** of the Democrats' **attacks on Musk and Tesla**. There has been **slight positive change in how swing voters view DOGE**.



- With government spending and waste (11% top priority) and Social Security and Medicare (10%) making their debuts on our list of what should be the top priority for Congress, inflation and the economy fell by -10 to one-quarter of voters surveyed. Concerns over threats to democracy (-3%) and illegal immigration and the border (-2%) also dropped, but not to the extent of inflation. It's important to keep in mind that our last survey was taken just days after Trump's announcement on global tariffs, which created a temporary but steep drop in the stock market.
  - Trump voters drove the shift away from economic concerns (-14%) and illegal immigration (-4%) once the two new response options were added to the Top Priority question. Harris voters shifted away most from economic concerns (-6%) and threats to democracy (-5%).
  - On the flip side, Trump voters, unsurprisingly shifted most towards saying Congress should most prioritize government spending and waste (+20), while Harris voters drove the prioritization of Social Security and Medicare (+15).
  - Another favorable sign for Republicans is that four-in-ten swing voters say inflation or government waste is their priority, compared with 8% who cite threats to democracy.
- Though inflation and cost of living have slipped in the reshuffle of the top priority for Congress, a majority (52%) of voters believe lowering the cost of living should be Donald Trump's utmost priority in the White House. Cutting wasteful spending comes in a distant second with 21%, followed by bringing jobs back to America, securing the border, and deporting criminal illegal aliens.
  - Swing voters want both Trump and Congress to most prioritize lowering the cost of living followed by cutting wasteful spending.



- Shifting back to party trust on issues, **swing voters trust the GOP by double digits on every issue** including +46 trust in the GOP on illegal immigration and border security and +36 trust of the GOP to handle cutting wasteful government spending. **Hispanic voters trust the GOP to handle illegal immigration and border security by a +15 clip** (51 GOP 36 Dem).
  - With the economic swings of the last month, the Democratic Party fares best on jobs and the economy (45% Dems) but still trail the GOP by two points on the issue.
- Nearly two-thirds (64%) of the country wants to deport those illegally in the United States back to their country of origin; just 31% disagree. Support for enforcing America's laws on illegal immigration stand at +41 net support with swing voters and +31 with Independents. 90% of GOP voters support deporting illegal immigrants; 55% of Democrats and 62% of very liberal voters oppose.
- By a +7 margin (46 39), voters side with the White House that El Salvadoran national and Democratic + media-cause celeb **Kilmar Abrego Garcia was rightfully deported back to El Salvador**. 79% of Republicans believe reports from the authorities that Abrego Garcia is a criminal illegal immigrant and MS-13 gang member. 67% of Democrats support the mainstream media narrative that the El Salvadoran national is instead a "**Maryland man**", **husband**, and **father** who should be returned to the United States as soon as possible.
- 58% support resetting the table and **renegotiating trade deals** with foreign countries. 33% of voters wish to **maintain the status quo** as it relates to trade. 76% of Republicans, 63% of swing voters, 57% of Indies, and 38% of Democrats support renegotiating our current trade deals. **Older men** (68%) and those living in **rural communities** (66%) are **most supportive of Trump's efforts**. Younger women (51%) and those in urban areas (50%) are least supportive a dichotomy (older men vs younger women) that defines both differences in the parties and ideological issue preferences.



- Fewer (48%) support increasing tariffs on China to force better trading terms for U.S. citizens. 62% of Democrats and 65% of Harris voters oppose increasing tariffs on China to use as leverage for better trading terms for the United States and its citizens. Union households (52% support) are more supportive than non-union homes.
- 52% of voters believe the federal court system is exercising **impartial oversight of the Trump Administration**, while 40% believe federal courts are deliberately trying to undermine Trump's presidency.
  - Democrats are more assured of the federal courts exercising impartial oversight (+68 net impartial) than Republicans who believe they're trying to undermine Trump (+47 net undermine).
     50% of swing voters and 56% of Independents agree with Democrats.
- 45% oppose **cutting federal government funding** to **NPR and PBS**. Democrats are +63 opposed to cuts; Republicans area +47 supportive.




- Segmentation analysis identified four groups via machine learning: GOP Base (36%), Lean GOP (14%), Dem Base (30%), and Lean Dem (21%).
  - <u>GOP Base</u> (36%) are **split by gender** and the **oldest segment** with more than 7-in-10 over the age of 55. The GOP Base is the **most rural**, most **evangelical**, and the segment most likely to be **married**. They pay **less attention** to the news than the *Dem Base* but watch Fox News when they do. The GOP Base is nearly equally concerned about illegal immigration, inflation, and cutting wasteful spending, and **98% want to deport illegal immigrants**.
  - <u>Lean GOP</u> (14%) are 81% favorable of Trump, and 71% plan to vote for the GOP congressional candidate in the midterms. They are most likely to pay a **great deal of attention** to the news (37%) and can be found most on **social media**. They are overwhelmingly **male** (69%), **younger** (94% <55), and **more racially diverse** (34% non-white) than the *GOP Base*. Though **less partisan and ideological** than the *GOP Base* they are **more likely to attend religious services**. Representative of the **new GOP**, they are the **most urban**, most likely to live in a **union household**, and most likely to have children under the age of 18. They want Congress and Trump to most prioritize lowering the **cost of living** and illegal immigration.



- <u>Dem Base</u> (30%) cares most about threats to democracy (43%), inflation (21%), and Social Security and Medicare (14%). They are +71 favorable of AOC but only +26 favorable of Chuck Schumer. 8-in-10 oppose using tariffs on China as leverage to get better deals for Americans. Nearly 9-in-10 pay at least a moderate amount of attention to the news and their preferred news sources are ABC, CBS, NBC, MSNBC, and CNN. The Dem Base skews female (57%), older (61% over the age of 55), liberal, suburban, and the most likely segment to be divorced. 82% are white. They are the least religious, least likely to attend religious services, and the most college-educated (60% degree) and highest-propensity segment. 83% want Abrego-Garcia to be brought back into the United States.
- <u>Lean Dem</u> (21%) voters opt for the Democratic candidate on the generic ballot, 68% 13%. Despite this, fewer than half trust Democrats more than the GOP to handle issues like illegal immigration and border security, crime and public safety, and cutting wasteful government spending. 58% support deporting illegal immigrants and they are more supportive of renegotiating trade deals than the *Lean GOP* segment. Lean Dem voters are far less radical than the Dem Base for instance, only 41% want to bring Abrego Garcia back into the United States. They are split (net even) on Schumer's image and +4 net favorable of AOC. Lean Dems are focused most on inflation, entitlement programs for older Americans, and healthcare. 38% are unsure of who the leader of the Democratic Party is today. They pay the least attention to news, are the lowest-propensity and least college-educated group in addition to being the least likely to be married, lowest income, most female (66%), and most diverse (45% non-white) segment.




#### **Top Priority**





#### **Trend: Top Priority**






#### Percent Change: Top Priority (Apr '25 to May '25)






#### **Trend: Vote Method**






#### Percent Change: Vote Method (Apr '25 to May '25)








## Things in the United States – Cygnal Emotional Analytics Among <u>All Likely Voters</u>






## Things in the United States – Cygnal Emotional Analytics

**Among Swing Voters** 





- Things are much more negative-emotions charged among swing voters.
- There is 8% more Anger and 5% more Fear.
- When digging into swing voters' Fear, the most powerful driver is **Criticism**, which is 2x stronger than Resentment & Disapproval.
  - A middle-aged female voter who mostly prefers Republicans said, things are "very unsteady, seems like there's no direction."
  - A moderate Independent noted, "I believe change is good. Too much change too fast causes stress and confusion."
- **Anxiety & Worry** is the secondary emotion driving the primary emotion of Fear. This is followed by Nervousness & Stress.
  - A millennial Independent stated, "It sucks prices are too high and wages don't reflect the times and inflation."
  - A rural Republican male said, "I feel like there is too much hate these days."




#### Things in the United States – Voters In Their Own Words

- Despite **optimism in the direction of the country** per Right Direction / Wrong Track reaching an all-time high in the Cygnal NVT (see next slide) **anger and fear** are the **most common emotions** in the United States, underscoring our **intense polarization**. Angry and fearful responses to how things are going in the United States with Trump in the helm are mostly rooted in secondary emotions of **criticism** (anger) and **anxiety and worry** (fear). Opponents of Trump mostly said the U.S. was headed in the **wrong** direction, but also commonly use descriptions like chaos and destroy(ing). **In their own words**...
  - "I am very concerned about the **chaos** and threat to democracy from Trump." 45 54 y/o college-educated male; Democrat.
  - "Donald Trump is destroying this country." 65+ y/o college-educated woman; Democrat.
- Those with a favorable opinion of Trump and/or say things are headed in the right direction responded primarily with joy and trust driven by power and confidence in addition to optimism and encouragement.
  - "I think things are going in the right direction because Trump is in charge." 30 44 y/o male with some college; Republican.
  - "Bumpy, but headed in the right direction." 45 54 y/o woman with some college; Independent.
- Like Trump's opponents, anger at how things are going in the country was even emoted by over 20% of those who say they have a favorable opinion of Trump. These voters lay the blame at the previous four years under Joe Biden.
  - "We are finally on a path of improvement BUT it will take time to reverse many bad policies." 45 – 54 y/o college-educated female; Republican.




#### **US Direction**




#### **Trend: US Direction**






#### Percent Change: US Direction (Apr '25 to May '25)






#### **Generic Ballot**






#### **Trend: Generic Ballot**






#### **Generic Ballot Movement**






#### Percent Change: Generic Ballot (Apr '25 to May '25)






### **Generic Ballot by Key Voter Groups**




### Percent Change: Elon Musk Image (Mar '25 to May '25)




